1. Leh in Winter

2. Frozen Pangong Lake

In winter, Pangong Tso freezes completely, creating a surreal frozen landscape. Walking on the solid ice of this high-altitude lake is a rare and thrilling experience.

3. Nubra Valley in Snow

Visiting Nubra Valley in winter offers snowy dunes and dramatic views of the Karakoram Range. The double-humped Bactrian camels still roam the cold desert of Hunder, though fewer rides are available.

4. Winter Festivals

Ladakh's winter festivals, like Dosmoche and Spituk Gustor, offer a glimpse into local traditions, complete with mask dances, rituals, and cultural celebrations.

Travel tips for Winter Ladakh

- **Extreme Cold:** Temperatures can drop to -20°C or lower, especially at night. Bring high-quality winter clothing, including thermal layers, gloves, and snow boots.
- **Limited Accessibility:** Some passes, such as Khardung La and Chang La, may be temporarily closed due to heavy snowfall. Flights are the only reliable way to reach Leh in winter.
- **Acclimatisation:** Proper acclimatisation is essential due to Ladakh's high altitude, even in winter.
- **Health Precautions:** Be prepared for dry air, chapped skin, and possible altitude sickness.
- **Stay Options:** Many hotels close during winter, but homestays and select guesthouses remain open, often with traditional heating like Bukhari stoves.

Itinerary •

Day 1: Pick up from Leh Airport | Dist: 10 km to 12 km | Altitude: 3300 m to 2600 m

- You will take a cab from Leh airport to your hotel.
- After checking in and relaxing, you can visit Leh Palace, Shanti Stupa, and Leh Market.
- Enjoy exploring these local attractions.

Night: Stay at the hotel in Leh

Day 2: Leh Local Sightseeing | Dist: 70 km to 90 km | Altitude: 3300 m to 2600 m

- After having breakfast, you'll head out for a day of local sightseeing.
- Visit the Hall of Fame, the peaceful Spituk Monastery, Gurudwara Pathar Sahib, and Magnetic Hill.

- Then, proceed to Sangam, where the Indus and Zaskar Rivers meet, creating a stunning natural spectacle.
- After a fulfilling day, return to your hotel to relax and unwind.

Night: Stay at the hotel in Leh

Day 3: Leh to Nubra via Khardung La | Dist: 160 km | Altitude: 3500 m to 5354 m

- Today, you will travel to Nubra Valley via Khardung La, which has the second-highest motorable pass.
- After reaching Nubra, you will visit Diskit Monastery, Hunder Village, Sand Dunes, and the Camel Ride Point.

Meals: Breakfast and Dinner

Night: Stay at a hotel/homestay in Nubra Valley

Day 4: Nubra Valley to Pangong | Dist: 200 km | Altitude: 3100 m to 4814 m

- Wake up to breathtaking views of the Karakoram ranges, then set off towards Pangong Tso, a high-altitude saline lake.
- Your journey will take you through the scenic villages of Shayok, Durbuk, and Tangste.
- Spend the night near the tranquil Pangong Lake.

Meals: Breakfast and Dinner

Night: Stay at a homestay in Pangong Tso

Day 5: Pangong to Leh via Chang La Pass | Dist: 150 km | Altitude: 3215 m to 5362 m

- After having breakfast, begin your journey back to Leh, travelling through the scenic Changla Pass, one of the world's highest mountain passes.
- Along the route, you'll stop at the beautiful Thiksey Monastery, Rancho School, made famous by the film *3 Idiots*, and explore the historic Shey Palace.
- By evening, you'll arrive in Leh and check into your hotel for a well-deserved rest.

Night: Stay at the hotel in Leh

Day 6: Depart | Morning 10:00 am

- Say goodbye to this fantastic Winter Ladakh Tour. You'll travel to Leh Airport with many great memories.
